Tickets are \$5 apiece (ages 10 and under are free), there will a delicious dinner for purchase, taco-in-a-bag, courtesy of volunteer Desiree Sirois, and many homemade baked goods all crafted by SETC staff and its teens! All proceeds are to benefit the Teen Center, and a 50/50 raffle will transpire during the game to benefit the family of Corporal Eugene Cole.

Waterville P.D Captain, Sergeant Lincoln Ryder has this to say about the event. "We have really enjoyed partnering with the Teen Center on the event and having a teen participate in the game. The yearly competition with the Fire Department has been a healthy (and sometimes intense) rivalry which has contributed positively (and plenty of ribbing for the loser that particular year). There have been several close games over the years, which were really exciting. There have been a few injuries in the past (cuts, broken bones) which we would like to avoid this year, if possible – the less EMS is involved in the game (other than playing) the better. Also a big part of the event is the opportunity to demonstrate good sportsmanship in athletic competition and to establish positive role models for youth."

Lieutenant Scott Holst of the Waterville Fire Department shared the following: "Sgt. Ryder and myself have been doing this event since it has started. Most games have always been very close. We did have one year, about 3 years ago, when the game went into 2 overtimes. That was a very fun game to watch. All games I know are supposed to be fun and entertaining, but there have been some in the past that took it to be a real knockout game [pun intended?]. In itself it makes it a competitive game, but it is also realized this is supposed to be fun and done for a fundraiser. I just wished we could bring out more people. We do get nice crowds, but I know we could do better."
